

Message from Executive Director

2023 marked a pivotal year of transitions and adaptation to new post-pandemic norms. With the lifting of the moratoriums on evictions and shutoffs, the harsh reality of pandemic induced financial strains became apparent for many clients and landlords. While pandemic relief funds initially provided crucial support, the year unveiled deep-seated wounds in the psychological, emotional, and financial well-being of countless households.

Initially there was a hopeful leveling off and reduction in requests for assistance. However, further examination revealed a growing number of households facing a heightened level of need. New eviction prevention and mobile outreach programs were launched in response to these findings.

The Eviction Diversion program has provided advocacy and support to households facing eviction, many for the first time. Similarly, the Mobile Outreach team has been instrumental in identifying and assessing the needs of unsheltered individuals and families living in their cars, tents, storage facilities, or other places not meant for human habitation. Family Promise of Sussex County adapted its shelter program early in the pandemic transitioning to individual apartments to prevent the spread of COVID-19. This new model has allowed for more effective outreach to single adults experiencing chronic homelessness, many with untreated medical and mental health conditions.

The pandemic's impact on homelessness has been stark with New Jersey experiencing a 17% increase in homelessness and Sussex County reporting a 137% increase in homelessness. Foreclosures are also on the rise, with New Jersey seeing a 34% increase in households facing foreclosure.

Amid these challenges, Family Promise of Sussex County remains committed to expanding shelter and transitional housing resources to address the community's growing needs. Collaboration and support from the community are vital in achieving housing stability for our neighbors in need.

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Rising Homelessness in New Jersey

New Jersey is currently facing a severe homelessness crisis:

- The 2023 Point-in-Time count has revealed that the number of homeless individuals has exceeded 10,000 for the first time since 2015
- This marks a 17% increase in homelessness compared to the previous year
- As of November 2023, New Jersey holds the highest foreclosure rate in the country, with 1 in every 595 homes in foreclosure
- Since January 2022, the lifting of the COVID-19 eviction moratorium has worsened the housing crisis in NJ, resulting in a backlog of eviction cases in the court system
- According to the National Low Income Housing
 Coalition's Gap Report, there are only 31 affordable rental
 units available for every 100 extremely low-income
 households in NJ
- 74% of extremely low-income individuals are under severe financial strain to maintain housing

Homelessness in Sussex County

Sussex County is facing significant challenges related to housing:

- Sussex County experienced a 137.3% increase in homelessness from the prior year, according to the 2023 Point-in-Time count
- The county is among the top five in the state with the highest foreclosure rates, with 1 in every 273 households affected
- Renting a one-bedroom apartment has increased by 40% in 2023, which is higher than the increase in wages, making it difficult for families to find affordable housing
- According to the National Low-Income Housing Coalition's
 Out of Reach report a full-time worker in Sussex County
 would need to earn \$30.88 per hour to afford a two-bedroom
 apartment at Fair Market Rent
- The Out of Reach report also found that 16% of renter households in Sussex County are spending more than 30% of their gross income on housing
- Eviction rates in Sussex County continue to remain at an alltime high



FPSC's Expanding Homelessness Services

Due to the rising demand for services in Sussex County, FPSC has expanded its offerings. Our staff has grown, and we have introduced new programs aimed at addressing homelessness and enhancing housing stability in our area. These initiatives include:

- Mobile Homelessness Outreach and Engagement
- Comprehensive Eviction Defense & Diversion
- Transitional Housing to Rapid Rehousing (Domestic Violence)
- DASH: Housing Resources
- Data-Driven Decision Making

Furthermore, we have established new satellite locations to better cater to our community, such as Sussex United Methodist Church on Bank Street in Sussex, and a computer lab at the First Presbyterian Church on Main Street in Sparta. Our offices at both Newton locations remain operational.









FPSC's Growing Impact

Throughout the years, the unwavering dedication of our staff at Family Promise of Sussex County has been truly remarkable. In 2021, we assisted 582 households in stabilizing their housing situations. This number saw a significant increase in 2022, with 674 households benefiting from our services.

By 2023, our commitment only strengthened as we reached out to an impressive 863 households through our housing programs and mobile outreach efforts. Moreover, our utility assistance team extended aid to 2904 separate households, demonstrating our ongoing commitment to supporting our community. The dedication of our staff is evident in the substantial increase of case management hours delivered, soaring to 5,411.

Client Stories

Anna made the difficult decision to take her pre-teen twins and flee.

She and the twins, one of whom has special needs, found safety in a domestic violence shelter, and remained there until they were no longer in danger. But Anna knew that once they left the shelter, they'd have nowhere to go. Anna was referred to Family Promise of Sussex County and entered the Rapid Rehousing Program. Here she had the financial and case management support she needed to get back up on her feet. She was determined to succeed and get back the normalcy her children had lost when they fled. She wanted a home, where her twins would have their own room again and she'd have a real kitchen where she could cook her family meals.

While in the program, Anna was able to increase her income, grow her savings and establish a home for herself and her children. The family of three and their beloved little terrier mix are now thriving in their two bedroom apartment with a full kitchen and a room just for the twins.



Jimmy is living in his own apartment for the first time in 26 years.

He's a veteran and after a drug addiction made daily living difficult, he settled down in one of New Jersey's state parks. Though he'd isolated himself in the park, he maintained a connection with his best friend, Brian, who would visit and help Jimmy when he needed it. Until a drunk driver took Brian's life.

Without Brian's support, Jimmy knew he would need to make a change. Family Promise of Sussex County enrolled him in the Emergency Shelter, which was a struggle for him at times because he wasn't used to sleeping on a bed or hearing the sounds of other people. But he persisted and after a little more than four months, he was ready for the next steps. Jimmy was admitted to the Permanent Supportive Housing program to support his chronic health issues, and has been living in his own apartment for the last ten months. He is so grateful for the help he receive that he's driven to give back, often offering to house others who need it.



Jenna found herself pregnant and homeless at 17.


She had been living with her grandmother, but the elderly woman lacked the resources to continue supporting her granddaughter. But Jenna didn't give up. She was motivated by her unborn child. She was determined that her baby would have everything he needed no matter what she needed to do to get it.

She found temporary respite at Birth Haven and spent the bulk of her pregnancy and the first four months of her newborn son's life there. But even though Jenna worked hard and was even able to get a better job, landlords didn't take her seriously. She was only 18 with a baby and no credit history. At Family Promise of Sussex County, she was connected to a landlord FPSC had worked with in the past and able to finally secure housing. Jenna has built up her savings and is living in a one-bedroom apartment with her now toddler son. She has big plans for the future.




2023 Financials

ANNUAL EXPENSES






Client Events








Social Media Campaigns
